*Exodus and Law: From Slavery to Covenant People*

## How We Built This Plan

**Chronological vs. Canonical:** Most Bible reading plans follow the canonical order (Genesis to Revelation). We've arranged Scripture *chronologically*—in the order events actually happened. This helps you understand *when* and *why* things occurred. For example, you'll read Job during the patriarchal period (where it belongs historically), and prophets alongside the kings they spoke to. This gives you the flow of history, not just the order books appear in your Bible.

**Inductive Method:** We use Howard Hendricks' proven inductive approach: Observe (What does it say?), Interpret (What does it mean?), and Apply (How does this change me?). This isn't just reading—it's studying. You're learning to think biblically, not just consume information. Other devotional plans often give you someone else's thoughts about a passage. We're teaching you to engage Scripture directly.

**Daily OT + NT Balance:** Unlike plans that front-load the Old Testament (leaving you exhausted by March), we give you *both* Old and New Testament every single day. This keeps Jesus and the Gospel present throughout the entire year. You're always seeing how the Old Testament points forward to Christ while reading about Christ Himself. This daily balance prevents burnout and maintains theological clarity.

**Complete Scripture Exposure:** Our goal is simple: expose you to the *entire* Bible in one year. Not just highlights, not just favorite passages—all of it. Every book. Every major story. Every theological movement. You'll read approximately 3-4 chapters daily (about 20 minutes). By December 31, you'll have read the whole counsel of God.

**Christ-Centered Devotional:** This plan doesn't just give you historical chronology—it helps you see how everything points to Jesus. Every Reflect and Explore section intentionally connects the passage to the unified story leading to Christ. We want your head and heart engaged. Information without transformation is just religious knowledge. Our prayer is that God's Word changes you.

*This isn't just another reading plan. It's a tool for deep, sustained engagement with Scripture. Welcome to the journey.*

## February Overview

February continues the Exodus story—God's mighty deliverance of Israel from Egypt through the plagues, Red Sea, and wilderness journey. We witness God giving His Law at Mount Sinai, establishing the covenant, and instructing Israel in worship through the tabernacle. In Matthew, Jesus delivers the Sermon on the Mount, revealing the heart of kingdom living and showing how He fulfills the Law. This month bridges the old covenant and the new, helping us see God's unchanging character and His plan to dwell with His people.

## How to Use This Plan

**READ (20 minutes daily):** Complete the daily Scripture readings in this order: Old Testament first, then New Testament, then the Psalm. Read them slowly. Let God's Word speak to you before jumping to the questions.

**REFLECT (Inductive Method):** Use the three questions: **Observe** (What does it say?), **Interpret** (What does it mean?), and **Apply** (How does this change me?). Take your time. Journal your thoughts. Let Scripture transform you.

**EXPLORE (Optional Depth):** For those wanting to dig deeper, each day includes cross-references, thematic connections, and theological insights to help you see how today's reading fits into the unified story of Scripture leading to Jesus.

## DAY 1: THE PASSOVER INSTITUTED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 10-12

**New Testament:** Matthew 5:27-48

**Psalm:** Psalm 101

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What does the Passover lamb protect Israel from in Exodus 12? How does Jesus raise the bar on the Law in Matthew 5?

**Interpret:** Why must the lamb be without defect? What kind of righteousness does Jesus require that exceeds the Pharisees?

**Apply:** How does Jesus' call to love enemies and be perfect challenge you today?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 12:5 with 1 Peter 1:18-19 and 1 Corinthians 5:7. Explore: Jesus is the ultimate Passover Lamb. The Sermon on the Mount reveals kingdom ethics—internal heart righteousness, not just external compliance.

## DAY 2: RED SEA DELIVERANCE AND WORSHIP

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 13-15

**New Testament:** Matthew 6:1-18

**Psalm:** Psalm 102:1-17

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How does God deliver Israel at the Red Sea? What does Jesus teach about genuine versus hypocritical religion?

**Interpret:** What does this rescue reveal about God's power and faithfulness? What motivates should drive prayer, fasting, and giving?

**Apply:** What 'Red Sea' situation requires you to trust God's intervention rather than your own strength?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 14:13-14 with 2 Chronicles 20:15 and Romans 8:31. Explore: God fights for His people. Jesus warns against practicing righteousness for human applause—God sees in secret and rewards openly.

## DAY 3: WILDERNESS PROVISION AND TRUST

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 16-18

**New Testament:** Matthew 6:19-34

**Psalm:** Psalm 102:18-28

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How does God provide manna and quail daily? What does Jesus teach about worry and treasure?

**Interpret:** What do the wilderness provisions teach about dependence on God? Where should we store our treasure?

**Apply:** What are you trusting in besides God for your security and provision?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 16:4 with John 6:31-35 and Philippians 4:19. Explore: Jesus is the bread of life. Seek first the kingdom—God knows your needs and will provide.

## DAY 4: THE LAW GIVEN AT SINAI

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 19-21

**New Testament:** Matthew 7

**Psalm:** Psalm 103:1-14

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How does God appear at Mount Sinai? How does Jesus conclude the Sermon on the Mount?

**Interpret:** What is the purpose of the Law? What foundation must life be built on according to Jesus?

**Apply:** Are you building on rock (obedience to Jesus) or sand (mere hearing)?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 19:5-6 with 1 Peter 2:9-10. Explore: Israel becomes God's treasured possession, a kingdom of priests. Jesus calls for obedience, not just knowledge—true discipleship means doing what He says.

## DAY 5: COVENANT CONFIRMED IN BLOOD

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 22-24

**New Testament:** Matthew 8:1-22

**Psalm:** Psalm 103:15-22

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How is the covenant ratified with blood in Exodus 24? What authority does Jesus demonstrate over disease and nature?

**Interpret:** What does the blood ceremony symbolize? Why do even demons recognize Jesus' authority?

**Apply:** Have you entered the new covenant through Jesus' blood?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 24:8 with Matthew 26:28 and Hebrews 9:18-22. Explore: Blood ratifies God's covenant. Jesus has authority over sickness, storms, and spiritual forces—He is Lord of all.

## DAY 6: TABERNACLE PLANS: GOD'S DWELLING

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 25-27

**New Testament:** Matthew 8:23-9:8

**Psalm:** Psalm 104:1-23

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What is the purpose of the tabernacle in Exodus 25-27? What does Jesus' authority over storms reveal?

**Interpret:** Why does God want to dwell with His people? Who has authority to forgive sins?

**Apply:** Do you see God as distant or as desiring to dwell with you?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 25:8 with John 1:14 and Revelation 21:3. Explore: God 'tabernacles' among His people. Jesus embodies God's presence—He forgives sins because He is God with us.

## DAY 7: PRIESTHOOD ESTABLISHED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 28-29

**New Testament:** Matthew 9:9-34

**Psalm:** Psalm 104:24-35

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What is the role of priests in Exodus? Who does Jesus call to follow Him?

**Interpret:** What does the high priest's garment 'for glory and beauty' signify? Why do religious leaders criticize Jesus for eating with sinners?

**Apply:** Do you see Jesus as welcoming broken people like you?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 28:2 with Hebrews 4:14-16 and 1 Peter 2:5, 9. Explore: Jesus is our great high priest. He calls tax collectors and sinners—those who know they need a physician.

## DAY 8: GOLDEN CALF DISASTER

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 30-32

**New Testament:** Matthew 9:35-10:20

**Psalm:** Psalm 105:1-22

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What goes catastrophically wrong while Moses is on the mountain? How does Jesus commission the Twelve?

**Interpret:** Why is idolatry so serious to God? What authority does Jesus give His disciples?

**Apply:** What idols compete with God for first place in your life?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 32:1-6 with Romans 1:21-23 and 1 Corinthians 10:7, 14. Explore: Israel quickly abandons God for a golden calf—a warning about idolatry. Jesus sends out the Twelve with His authority to proclaim the kingdom.

## DAY 9: GOD'S GLORY AND CHARACTER REVEALED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 33-34

**New Testament:** Matthew 10:21-42

**Psalms:** Psalm 105:23-45

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What does Moses request to see in Exodus 33? What does Jesus promise His disciples will face?

**Interpret:** What does God reveal about His character in Exodus 34:6-7? What cost comes with following Jesus?

**Apply:** Have you asked God to reveal His glory to you?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 34:6-7 with John 1:14, 17 and 2 Corinthians 3:18. Explore: God's character is compassionate yet just. Jesus warns of persecution but promises the Father's care and eternal reward.

## DAY 10: TABERNACLE CONSTRUCTION BEGINS

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 35-37

**New Testament:** Matthew 11

**Psalms:** Psalm 106:1-23

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How do the people contribute to building the tabernacle? What does Jesus offer the weary?

**Interpret:** What does willing, joyful giving reveal about worship? What is Jesus' 'yoke'?

**Apply:** Is your worship characterized by generous giving or grudging duty?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 35:5, 21-22 with 2 Corinthians 9:7 and Mark 12:41-44. Explore: Freewill offerings pour in abundantly—people give willingly when their hearts are moved. Jesus offers rest to the weary—His yoke is easy, His burden light.

## DAY 11: TABERNACLE COMPLETED, GLORY FILLS IT

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Exodus 38-40

**New Testament:** Matthew 12:1-21

**Psalm:** Psalm 106:24-48

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What happens when the tabernacle is finished? What does Jesus teach about the Sabbath?

**Interpret:** What does God's glory filling the tabernacle signify? Who is Lord of the Sabbath?

**Apply:** Do you view God's commands as burdensome restrictions or life-giving wisdom?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Exodus 40:34-38 with 1 Kings 8:10-11 and John 2:19-21. Explore: God's presence fills the tabernacle in cloud and fire. Jesus is greater than the temple—He embodies God's presence and is Lord over the Sabbath.

## DAY 12: SACRIFICIAL SYSTEM ESTABLISHED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 1-4

**New Testament:** Matthew 12:22-50

**Psalm:** Psalm 107:1-22

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What different offerings does God prescribe? What blasphemy do the Pharisees commit?

**Interpret:** What does each offering accomplish? What is the unforgivable sin Jesus warns about?

**Apply:** What sacrifice has Jesus made on your behalf that these offerings foreshadowed?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 1:4 with Hebrews 10:1-10 and Romans 12:1. Explore: Old Testament sacrifices point forward to Jesus' perfect sacrifice. Blasphemy against the Spirit is persistent, willful rejection of God's work attributed to Satan.

## DAY 13: GUILT AND FELLOWSHIP OFFERINGS

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 5-7

**New Testament:** Matthew 13:1-30

**Psalm:** Psalm 107:23-43

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What makes someone guilty before God? What parable does Jesus tell about wheat and weeds?

**Interpret:** How is guilt atoned for? Why does Jesus let wheat and weeds grow together until harvest?

**Apply:** Where do you need to confess guilt and make restitution?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 6:4-5 with Luke 19:8 and James 5:16. Explore: Guilt requires both confession and restitution. The kingdom grows with genuine believers and false professors mixed—final separation comes at judgment.

## DAY 14: PRIESTS CONSECRATED; NADAB AND ABIHU DIE

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 8-10

**New Testament:** Matthew 13:31-58

**Psalms:** Psalm 108

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What happens to Nadab and Abihu who offer unauthorized fire? Why is Jesus rejected in Nazareth?

**Interpret:** What does their story teach about approaching God rightly? How does familiarity breed contempt?

**Apply:** Do you approach God carelessly or with appropriate reverence?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 10:1-3 with Hebrews 12:28-29 and 1 Samuel 6:19-20. Explore: God is holy and must be approached on His terms. Jesus is dishonored in His hometown—those who watched Him grow up can't see who He truly is.

## DAY 15: CLEAN AND UNCLEAR LAWS

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 11-13

**New Testament:** Matthew 14:1-21

**Psalms:** Psalm 109:1-19

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What does God teach about clean and unclean? What does Jesus do when He hears of John the Baptist's death?

**Interpret:** What is the purpose of these dietary and purity laws? How does Jesus respond to tragedy with compassion?

**Apply:** How do you respond when you hear about loss or tragedy?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 11:44-45 with 1 Peter 1:15-16 and Mark 7:14-23. Explore: Holiness extends to daily life. Jesus grieves John's death but then serves the crowds, feeding 5,000 with compassion.

## DAY 16: PURIFICATION RITUALS

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 14-15

**New Testament:** Matthew 14:22-36

**Psalm:** Psalm 109:20-31

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How is a person cleansed from skin disease? What miracle does Jesus perform on water?

**Interpret:** What do these elaborate cleansing rituals point to? What does Peter's attempt to walk on water teach?

**Apply:** When do you start to sink because you take your eyes off Jesus?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 14 with Luke 5:12-14 and 2 Kings 5:10-14. Explore: Only God can truly make clean. Peter walks by faith but sinks when fear overtakes faith—Jesus rescues him immediately.

## DAY 17: DAY OF ATONEMENT

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 16-18

**New Testament:** Matthew 15:1-20

**Psalm:** Psalm 110

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What happens on the Day of Atonement? What does Jesus teach about tradition versus God's commands?

**Interpret:** What does the scapegoat symbolize? What truly defiles a person?

**Apply:** What religious traditions have you elevated above God's Word?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 16 with Hebrews 9:1-14, 10:1-4 and Matthew 15:8-9. Explore: The Day of Atonement foreshadows Jesus—He is both priest and sacrifice. True defilement comes from the heart, not external things.

## DAY 18: PRACTICAL HOLINESS IN DAILY LIFE

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 19-21

**New Testament:** Matthew 15:21-39

**Psalm:** Psalm 111

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How should holiness affect everyday behavior? How does Jesus respond to the Canaanite woman?

**Interpret:** What does 'love your neighbor as yourself' mean in practice? What does her persistence reveal about faith?

**Apply:** How do you treat people considered 'outsiders' by your community?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 19:18 with Matthew 22:39 and Romans 13:8-10. Explore: The Law's summary is love. Jesus extends mercy beyond Israel to Gentiles—faith and persistence move Him.

## DAY 19: FEASTS AND HOLY DAYS

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 22-23

**New Testament:** Matthew 16

**Psalm:** Psalm 112

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What do Israel's feasts commemorate? Who does Peter confess Jesus is?

**Interpret:** How do the feasts shape Israel's identity and remembrance? What does it cost to follow Jesus?

**Apply:** What practices help you remember God's faithfulness regularly?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 23 with Colossians 2:16-17 and 1 Corinthians 5:6-8. Explore: The feasts point forward to Christ. Peter's confession is foundational—Jesus is the Messiah who must die and rise.

## DAY 20: SABBATH YEAR AND JUBILEE

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 24-25

**New Testament:** Matthew 17

**Psalm:** Psalm 113

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What is the purpose of the Jubilee year? What do three disciples see on the mountain?

**Interpret:** How does Jubilee picture God's ultimate redemption? Who is Jesus revealed to be at the Transfiguration?

**Apply:** What debt or burden has Jesus cancelled for you?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 25:10 with Luke 4:18-19 and Isaiah 61:1-2. Explore: Jubilee releases slaves and cancels debts—a picture of gospel freedom. The Transfiguration reveals Jesus' divine glory.

## DAY 21: COVENANT BLESSINGS AND CURSES

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Leviticus 26-27

**New Testament:** Matthew 18:1-20

**Psalm:** Psalm 114

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What does God promise for obedience and disobedience? What does Jesus teach about true greatness?

**Interpret:** Why are the consequences for covenant breaking so severe? What makes someone great in God's kingdom?

**Apply:** Do you take God's commands seriously, or treat them casually?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Leviticus 26 with Deuteronomy 28 and Galatians 3:10-14. Explore: The covenant includes both blessing and curse. Jesus says become like children, pursue humility, and deal seriously with sin.

## DAY 22: CENSUS AND CAMP ORGANIZATION

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 1-3

**New Testament:** Matthew 18:21-35

**Psalm:** Psalm 115

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How is Israel organized in Numbers? How many times should we forgive?

**Interpret:** What does this military organization reveal about God's order? Why must we forgive without limit?

**Apply:** Who do you need to forgive as you've been forgiven?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 1:1-3 with Revelation 7:4-8. Explore: God numbers and organizes His people for the journey ahead. We forgive endlessly because we've been forgiven an unpayable debt.

## DAY 23: LEVITES' DUTIES AND NAZIRITE VOW

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 4-6

**New Testament:** Matthew 19:1-15

**Psalm:** Psalm 116

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What is the Nazirite vow? What does Jesus teach about marriage and children?

**Interpret:** What does special consecration to God look like? Why does Jesus welcome little children?

**Apply:** What commitment or vow have you made to God?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 6:1-8 with Judges 13:5 and Acts 21:23-24. Explore: The Nazirite vow symbolizes total dedication. Jesus upholds marriage's permanence and welcomes children as models of kingdom faith.

## DAY 24: OFFERINGS AND PASSOVER OBSERVED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 7-9

**New Testament:** Matthew 19:16-30

**Psalm:** Psalm 117

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How do the tribal leaders give offerings? What does the rich young man ask Jesus?

**Interpret:** What does wholehearted, generous giving look like? What barrier keeps this man from the kingdom?

**Apply:** What do you value more than following Jesus wholeheartedly?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 7 with 1 Chronicles 29:14 and Mark 10:21. Explore: Leaders give generously for God's work. Riches can be a barrier to faith when we trust wealth more than God.

## DAY 25: JOURNEY BEGINS, COMPLAINTS ARISE

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 10-12

**New Testament:** Matthew 20:1-19

**Psalm:** Psalm 118:1-18

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** How do Miriam and Aaron oppose Moses? What parable does Jesus tell about vineyard workers?

**Interpret:** Why is complaining against God-appointed leadership so serious? How does God's generosity differ from human fairness?

**Apply:** Do you grumble against leaders God has placed in your life?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 12:3 with Philippians 2:3 and Hebrews 13:17. Explore: Moses' humility contrasts with his siblings' pride. God is generous beyond merit—all wages are grace.

## DAY 26: THE TWELVE SPIES AND UNBELIEF

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 13-14

**New Testament:** Matthew 20:20-34

**Psalm:** Psalm 118:19-29

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What do the twelve spies report? What does Jesus teach about greatness in His kingdom?

**Interpret:** Why do ten spies lack faith while two trust God? What does it mean to truly serve?

**Apply:** When has fear kept you from obeying God's clear call?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 13:30 with Hebrews 3:7-19 and Joshua 14:6-14. Explore: Caleb and Joshua trust God despite the giants. Greatness in God's kingdom means servant leadership, not worldly power.

## DAY 27: KORAH'S REBELLION JUDGED

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 15-17

**New Testament:** Matthew 21:1-22

**Psalm:** Psalm 119:1-32

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What happens to Korah's rebellion against Moses? How does Jesus enter Jerusalem?

**Interpret:** Why is challenging God's appointed authority dangerous? What does Jesus do at the temple?

**Apply:** Do you submit to God's authority, or do you resist and rebel?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 16 with Jude 11 and 1 Samuel 8:7. Explore: Rebelling against God's leaders is rebelling against God. Jesus cleanses the temple with divine authority—He is the true King.

## DAY 28: WATER FROM THE ROCK, MOSES' SIN

### ■ READ

**Old Testament:** Numbers 18-20

**New Testament:** Matthew 21:23-46

**Psalm:** Psalm 119:33-64

### ■ REFLECT (Observe • Interpret • Apply)

**Observe:** What happens when Moses strikes the rock? How does Jesus answer questions about His authority?

**Interpret:** Why is Moses punished for this seemingly small act? What parables does Jesus tell about Israel's rejection?

**Apply:** Where have you presumed on God's grace or represented Him wrongly?

### ■ EXPLORE (Optional Depth)

Cross-reference: Numbers 20:8-12 with Psalm 106:32-33 and 1 Corinthians 10:4. Explore: Moses' anger dishonors God and costs him entry to Canaan. Jesus exposes religious leaders' rejection through parables.
